Non-compliance continues at Brookby Road site



Auckland Council's compliance team has served the owners of 495 Brookby Road (pictured above) with further abatement notices.

Run-ins between Auckland Council and the owners of the unusually fenced property at 495 Brookby Road continue.

A further two abatement notices have recently been issued by Auckland Council to the property owners, continuing on from a three-year history of illegal works at the site.

As reported by the PC Times on 25 August 2023, council is well acquainted with the property which has continued to carry on site work without obtaining the correct council consents.

On 17 December 2020 an abatement notice was served to two of the landowners, stopping all earthworks and importation of fill materials at the site until all breaches had been remedied. As part of their compliance with the abatement notice, the site owners commissioned a report by Focus Environmental Services Ltd dated February 2021, which said that the site had been subject to uncertified filling and fly tipping and

that contaminated material had been deposited at the site. The report gave details of site soil samples which showed concentrations of arsenic, cadmium, lead and zinc which exceeded the Soil Contaminant Standards for health for rural residential land use.

The site owners were tasked with removing about 10 tonnes of contaminated soil from the site, which was transported to Hampton Downs Landfill for disposal.

Over the past three years council staff have allowed the site owners a number of deadline extensions to help them comply with council regulations.

In response to a more recent complaint regarding the property, council compliance offers issued two further abatement notices on 21 November 2023 for not complying

Seems that after a few years of either Covid related disruption or rubbish weather, we have enjoyed the warm temperatures that summer is designed to bring. For a coastal area such as the Pohutukawa Coast, this means the benefits of living near the sea and our wonderful beaches can be maximised not only by those living here but also the visitors that come to experience what our residents do on a daily basis. That doesn't always guarantee love and harmony of the foreshore and so hopefully this year with the huge numbers that have used our beaches and parks be it as a "local" or a visitor, the issues have been managed and we can all ponder just how fortunate we are to have these areas at our doorstep. If the forecasters are right, there is a bit of this weather still to come so fingers crossed, particularly as I have a garden wedding coming up in early March.

At the end of February, everyone will be able to have their say on what Council's priorities over the next 10 years should be. The draft 10 year budget or Long Term Plan (LTP) will be released on 28 Feb for a month long public consultation period.

This time instead of putting out the Mayor's proposal and asking what you like or don't, we have taken the step of asking you to consider three different options. Firstly, one where rates increases are kept to a minimum

and accordingly what is done by Council is also at a minimum. This is called the spend less, get less model.

proposal which is a sort of middle ground where rates increases are scaled over the years and things like road maintenance funding are prioritised to respond to what we have been hearing this past year.

The third option is the interesting one for me. I am interested in how many people are prepared to go hard by having higher short and medium term rates increases to fund more stuff that we so often hear is needed. The message I think that has been very clear and something I campaigned on is that there is a need for us as a Council (including our CCOs like Auckland Transport) to do things differently and get better bang for our ratepayer buck.

This LTP is one of the most important budgets Auckland Council has had to put in place as now is the time that we have to do what we can to get the most out of the council structure created 13 years ago. We cannot meander along doing the same things expecting that ratepayers and the Government will just make up shortfalls. So I encourage everyone to have a think about what, how, why and where we should be doing things and how realistically that can be delivered and funded.

Another interesting bit of work being done at the moment is a review of our Governance structure and in particular

the number and size of Local Boards. I am on record saving when on the Local Board that we have too many The second option is the Mayor's Local Boards and too many elected representatives across all parts of council. I retain that view and feel we should be looking at Local Boards as a way of combining communities of interest to determine boundaries and not rely on population and a ratio of so many people per elected rep as we do now. I pushed hard during the lead up to the position we are in now to ensure rural areas such as Franklin and Rodney retained representation instead of an at large type model. Nothing over the last 13 or so years on Council has convinced me that those elected from the urban parts of Auckland have any knowledge or real interest in the fact that rural Auckland is vastly different than what happens in the city area.

I also want to see Local Boards given not only far greater decision making ability but also much more accountability and responsibility for the budgets they are responsible for. This could take the form of local rates collected within a Board boundary or more localised targeted rates. That thinking missed the cut in the LTP drafting but I am going to continue to work on it for the future.

Enjoy the rest of the summer everyone and here's to a great 2024.

with the Resource Management Act.

According to Auckland Council compliance manager Adrian Wilson, the first abatement notice was to cease earthworks on the property immediately, which the property owner complied with. The second abatement notice was issued to address the fill that was brought into the property. The final date for compliance with this notice was 11 December 2023.

The PC Times understands that the fill

in question is contaminated by building rubble and road millings.

Adrian Wilson says that council officers conducted a further site visit recently, and confirmed that no further works had been undertaken on the property.

"The property owner has requested an extension to the compliance date as he is required to provide council with a detailed site inspection report," says Adrian.

"As the property owner is working with council to achieve compliance, we have granted an extension until 29 February 2024 for the report.

"Once the detailed site investigation report has been received, the council will review the findings and, if accepted, instruct the property owner to carry out the remedial actions detailed in the report by a specified date."

Speaking to the PC Times in 2022, a family member associated with the site said their plans were to grow vegetables and strawberries at the site, as well as housing a range of birds. Original plans included a cafe/ice-cream shop and kids playground, and a vegetable store.

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Auckland Transport responds to pleas for safer pedestrian crossing in Maraetai

Auckland Transport is proposing to upgrade the existing zebra crossing on Maraetai Drive outside Maraetai Beach School.

The crossing requires safety improvements to bring it to current standards - including placing it on a raised 'Swedish-style' platform to encourage slower traffic speeds.

A high number of pedestrians cross at the existing zebra crossing on Maraetai Drive, which is located on a downhill grade and on a horizontal curve. Traffic heading towards Maraetai beach tends to approach the existing crossing at high speeds.

Both Maraetai Beach School and Franklin Local Board have asked AT to address safety issues at the existing crossing.

Maraetai School Board of Trustees chair Simone Beesley says the board has had serious concerns about the safety of the existing pedestrian crossing since 2022, following a "near miss".

In 2023 both Simone and school principal Mark Keenan met with local councillor Andrew Baker and Franklin Local Board member Malcolm Bell to discuss a number of issues impacting on road safety around the school, including the school's increasing roll, adjacent early childhood education centres and change to the use of Te Pene Road as a major entrance to the school.

Simone says the existing public bus timetable does not align with school hours and therefore does not provide an option for students travelling to Maraetai Beach School via public transport.

"Despite upgrades to crossings in urban areas (Macleans College, Cockle Bay, Howick Intermediate and Sandspit Road) Auckland Transport has not prioritised the formation of a comprehensive transport plan for our school," says Simone.

"We raised these issues with the team from Auckland Transport. With support from Andy and Malcolm we requested an upgrade to the crossing and following assessment of the existing crossing the team commenced work on a design for upgrading the crossing."

Auckland Transport says a "do-nothing" option was considered but it would not address the need for a safe crossing that meets current standards.

"The option of placing the raised zebra crossing on a standard table was considered, however, Maraetai Drive is a bus route and a secondary arterial road and so a Swedish-style table is required to accommodate buses and heavy vehicles," says AT spokesperson Natalie Polley.

"Alternative locations for the proposed raised crossing were considered further to the west and east of the existing location. However, discussions with the

school confirmed that from the crossing management perspective, the proposed location around the existing crossing is preferred."

Simone says the wellbeing of the school's kaiako/teachers, akonga/students and their whanau is a key priority for the

Board of Trustees.

"This includes doing what we can to promote safe and sustainable travel to and from school.

"We support the upgrade and look forward to completion of improvement works in 2024."



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Clevedon locals raise concerns over Council's new flood mapping

The release of Auckland Council's updated flood mapping tool has some local residents questioning its accuracy, and the impact of the updated flood maps on property values.

Auckland Council unveiled its updated flood mapping tool last year, which is available for the public to access online.

The online tool is designed to provide information about flood-prone areas in extreme weather events (which have a 1 per cent chance of happening in any given year, also known as a 1-in-100 year flood event). The maps give information about flood plains, flood prone areas, overland flow paths and coastal inundation areas.

The flood maps show significant swathes of Clevedon, Kawakawa Bay and Umupuia could be underwater if an extreme weather event were to occurmore than previously identified in older versions of the flood mapping tool, and including areas that were not underwater during any of last year's flood events.

Healthy Waters Head of Planning Nicholas Vigar explains why more areas have been identified as being at risk:

"Climate change and future development are included for flood prone areas and most floodplains. Climate change projections for Tāmaki Makaurau show that the intensity of extreme rainfall events is

The release of Auckland Council's likely to continue to increase in a warmer updated flood mapping tool has some future.

"Even in a big rainfall event, there is a lot of spatial variation in rainfall from area to area. During the [2023] Auckland Anniversary weekend floods there was more exposure in the central, north and western areas than there was in the eastern areas of Tāmaki Makaurau. Not all Tāmaki Makaurau received a 1 per cent storm which the flood information in the Flood Viewer relates to. The tide level also impacts the level of flooding experienced.

"It is important to note that the flooding information is an indication of the area of land that will flood. It does not consider the height of a building in relation to the depth of the flood water.

"The floodplains in Clevedon are for a 3.8-degree climate change scenario and future development. However, we know that each storm event occurring in real life is unique and could have multiple factors that differ from what is represented in the model. This is why the modelled/published flood plains may differ from what is observed. Therefore, we do not consider observed flood extents as evidence for mapping or updating flood plains. While the floodplain map is indicative only, we accept its accuracy regarding land shown on the floodplain map as being outside the floodplain."

Clevedon Protection Society representative Tristan Ilich says the new maps raise questions about the impact on a number of Clevedon properties including existing older properties, newer developments and proposed developments.

"What impact do these new flood maps have on existing properties values and ability to develop/modify in the future. Will property owners be able to build or renovate on their land in the future?" questions Tristan.

Auckland Council General Manager, Healthy Waters Craig McIlroy says the new maps use the same information that the consenting team currently use in their decision making when new resource and building consents are applied for.

"A LIM report is generated on request, meaning that it will always provide the most current information available at the time of request, including flood data shown in Geomaps and the Flood Viewer.

"We do not notify property owners as data is updated, however, LIMs are always available publicly for anyone to request and anyone can access and find flood data on the Flood Viewer."

Tristan also questions the impact the new flood maps will have on current and future housing developments within Clevedon, asking whether the developments will now be viable if the new flood mapping tool shows parts of them could be underwater in a 1-in-100 year flood event.

Auckland Council director of Regulatory Services Craig Hobbs says any applications for building or resource consents in flood plains will need to show that risks associated with future flood events can be avoided or managed effectively. Where risks are not adequately avoided or minimised, the council can decline a resource or building consent application.

Areas of one recently completed development, Clevedon North, are now shown to lie within the flood plain. Auckland Council says that the development was consented in 2019, before the most recent update to the flood maps, but that the finished ground levels of Clevedon North were raised where required to ensure that each site contained a building area that was above the 1-in-100-year flood plain. These raised gound levels are not reflected on the new flood map viewer due to the timing of the earthworks.

Conmara, which is selling sections at its site on the southern side of Papakura Clevedon Road, says it engaged consultants late last year to run more models with the new council flood map. Conmara spokesperson Cameron Ross





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

says the modelling shows their sections are 100% above the flood plain areas shown on the new maps.

With respect to sites that have received resource consent but have not yet been developed, Auckland Council says any building consents would need to take into account the most recent flood data and ensure appropriate mitigations are put in place to comply with the Building Code. Craig Hobbs says: "Again, we cannot revoke a Building or Resource Consent once issued, however, it is up to the developer to consider the consequences of the new information and update their proposal if necessary.

"Please note that work is currently underway to strengthen the Auckland Unitary Plan (AUP) to reduce the region's vulnerability to flooding and other climate impacts. This work includes looking into how the current management of flood risk for new developments can be improved, including consideration of whether future development in floodplains should be further limited through the use of zoning. These improvements are intended to be included in a future plan change to the AUP."

The flood maps show a number of key arterial roads in and out of Clevedon now also lie within flood prone areas, suggesting Clevedon could become

completely cut off in the event of a 1 per for climate adaptation, Ashishika Sharma, cent event.

Auckland Transport's principal specialist

says Auckland Transport is in the process of identifying roads where flooding is a major hazard, but that as yet there are no plans on how to manage these areas.

"We're starting long-term adaptation plans for these roads, prioritising areas where there are no alternative access routes or areas where the roads are considered critical because they lead to hospitals, fire stations or schools.

"Where communities are in flood hazard areas, consideration needs to be given to adaptation plans for the communities/ private properties. It may not be as simple as Auckland Transport raising the roads to be out of flood hazard areas, as this can cause ponding effects on nearby properties. Long-term plans for communities in flood hazard areas are required, however central government is yet to provide guidance on how this should be managed. Auckland Council will lead the consultations with the communities in these areas and Auckland Transport will carry out necessary works to ensure that access is maintained as per those plans."

Tristan Ilich says it would be good to see Auckland Council consult publicly with property owners and developers to understand the impact of the changes to flood maps.

The flood map viewer is publicly available to view by searching online for 'Auckland Council Flood Viewer'.

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Firearm Safety Authority issues summer-season advice for gun owners

Te Tari Pūreke/Firearms Safety Authority is urging people who use firearms to take extra care when transporting or storing them over summer.

If you're looking to travel with firearms, or you'll be leaving them at home while you're away, here are a few top safety and security tips:

Travelling with firearms:

- Firearms can never be left in a vehicle overnight. So, if you pack the vehicle the night before, for an early start in the morning, make sure you leave time and space, and pack your firearm just before you travel.
- Firearms must be transported out of sight. Dedicate a spot in the vehicle where they can't be seen if someone looks through the window.
- Firearms must either be inoperable (bolt out or trigger lock in) or in a locked container when travelling. Do both where you can.
- Ammunition must be transported separately to the firearm, and in a locked container if practical. This will make it more difficult to access both the firearm and ammunition if someone breaks into your vehicle.
- Firearms can only be left unattended in a locked vehicle for 60 minutes (while you're nearby). So, plan your

meal and rest breaks accordingly.

Storing firearms so they don't get into the wrong hands:

- Think about what you'll do with your firearm once you get to your holiday destination. If you're staying with friends and family who own firearms, ask to use their storage.
- If you use a regular hut or bach, install a gun safe, a firearm rack or secure cable system.
- Steel cables and padlocks can help secure your firearm to the framing of a building, pipes or built in furniture.
- Store vital parts and ammunition separately to your firearm.

Keeping firearms safe and secure at home while you're away:


- Make your firearms and ammunition storage even more secure while you're away. Take the keys with you, cover up gun safes and ammunition storage - so they're not easily visible. Hide other valuable items like tools or electronics (thieves may start off looking for one thing and leave with your firearms instead).
- If you're heading away for an extended period think about the security of your firearms. Consider installing an alarm, security cameras

or sensor lights.

- Put things in place to make it look like you're home e.g. arrange for someone to mow your lawn and collect the mail, have internal lights on a timer.
- firearms before you go on holiday. If you do get burgled and your firearms are stolen, the Registry will provide an accurate picture of which firearms were taken.

Alcohol and firearms:

- Many of us like to have a few drinks over the Christmas holidays. It's important to remember though, that alcohol and firearms don't mix.
- If you want to have a drink when you get back from a hunt, lock your firearms up first. Gears before beers can stop an accident!
- If you've had a few beers and there's a possum in the tree or a rabbit in the paddock it will probably still be there tomorrow. It's not worth risking something going wrong.

Quarry applies for expansion

Brookby Quarry has applied under the Covid-19 Fast Track Consenting Act to significantly expand operations at its Kimptons Road site.

The quarry's Stage 3 application seeks to extract up to 110 million tonnes of aggregate over the next 60 years enough aggregate to pave about 100,000 kilometres of road.

It will also carry out earthworks, remove vegetation, and reclaim stream beds.

Brookby Quarry says that if approved, the Stage 3 expansion project will generate about 65 full time jobs over 60 years, and will provide much-needed aggregate for construction of infrastructure in the Auckland area.

The application will be considered by a panel of experts.

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

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
