

Watercare proposes multi-million dollar upgrade options for Beachlands Wastewater Treatment Plant

With its resource consent ending in 2025, and population reaching critical mass, Watercare has recently held two information sessions asking locals what they think about five different options for upgrading the Beachlands Wastewater Treatment Plant on Okaroro Drive.

Watercare says upgrades to the existing wastewater treatment plant are required due to the projected future growth in Beachlands and Maraetai communities, and the wastewater treatment plant nearing the end of its design life. The current plant's consent is due for renewal on 31 December 2025

After consulting with members of the community and mana whenua in October, Watercare narrowed a long-list of 20 options down to 5 preferred options for dealing with the Pohutukawa Coast's wastewater. In addition to upgrading the existing treatment plant, the 5 options also discuss alternative ways to discharge the wastewater.

The five options are summarised below (a full description is available at watercare. co.nz - search for Beachlands):

- **Option 2A:** Wastewater is treated at the existing Beachlands Wastewater Treatment Plant site then discharged to a tributary of the Te Puru Stream, via an overland flow discharge field covering about 4-6ha
- Option 2B: Wastewater is treated at the existing Beachlands Wastewater Treatment Plant site then discharged directly into a tributary of the Te Puru Stream
- **Option 3:** Wastewater is treated at the existing Beachlands Wastewater Treatment Plant site, stored in a lagoon then discharged via low pressure sprinkler irrigation to 750ha of land within a 10km radius of the treatment plant
- directly into a tributary of the Te \$262M to \$574M.



Franklin residents will be asked if they would pay a \$52 annual targeted rate to help pay for pathways in the district when Auckland Council consults on its 10-year Budget.

That consultation does not happen until next year, but Board chair Angela Fulljames says Franklin has asked for the question to be included.

"We recommended the Governing Body consult on introducing a Franklin Local Board Paths Targeted Rate of \$52 (GST incl) increasing each year with inflation, on all rateable properties to fund additional paths investment as part of the 10-year Budget.

"Active transport modes - walking and cycling, are a priority for us. Our communities have shown a consistent interest in options that enable them to contribute to climate action at a local level, and we have so far allocated around \$2.4 million to progress paths in partnership with community groups.

"We have developed a programme for additional investment across all three subdivisions, Wairoa, Pukekohe, and Waiuku that would have to be funded by a targeted rate.

"Investment in paths infrastructure is a public good. The paths generate benefits to the entire area through improved connections between residential, transport, and urban hubs."

The board is following through after an earlier public consultation indicated people were willing for information to be gathered so an informed decision can be reached.

"Early indications from meetings Franklin Ward Councillor Andy Baker and I are attending are that the more we as a board can generate in project revenue, and thus control within our area, the more likely we are to deliver these sorts of projects, given budget restraints," Fulliames says.

Council staff have recommended the targeted rate – and annual inflation increases – to generate around \$20 million over the period of Council's 10-year Budget 2024-2034.

The proposed paths would mainly be in urban areas and connect with existing paths as well as the wider public transport network.

At its meeting last week, the Governing Body agreed to consult on the targeted rate next year.

Strategy sets growth path

A strategy to govern the city's growth over the next three decades has been welcomed by Auckland Council's Andy Baker.

The Franklin Ward councillor says

the Future Development Strategy is a way of ensuring homes, jobs, and infrastructure are built in the right places, and balances the need for development in urban or 'brownfield' areas with new 'greenfield' sites.

Baker says working with the board has resulted in specific features for Franklin, meaning work can be done that recognises the area's features, especially existing and planned employment opportunities.

"A lot of our people must travel to work. We need to create a better balance if we want to enable investment in schools, transport options and meet our carbon emissions targets."

Baker voted against the draft strategy because it did not sufficiently consider areas like Franklin, but the changes made give him confidence in the adopted plan.

"We have all seen prime land taken for housing, and that remains an issue, but the strategy also avoids development in flooding and natural hazard risk areas, where a high bar has been set for those wanting to develop, and some of the most at-risk parts of the future urban zone revert to rural zoning."

He says the strategy seeks to concentrate development around existing infrastructure. "That is common-sense, the cost of building infrastructure to support developments outside those areas has proven challenging.

"The strategy will help create a city where people can live close to work and the amenities they need, which will in turn enable easier public transport, protect our environment and reduce emissions."

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

Police outline plan for patrols at local beaches over summer

As the holiday season approaches, Counties Manukau East Police are gearing up to ensure the safety and well-being of community members and visitors. With the influx of people during the summer months, particularly on public holidays and weekends, police say they are aware of the need to maintain a secure and enjoyable environment for everyone.

The policing team will have a strong focus on all local beaches including Beachlands, Maraetai, Umupuia, Eastern Beach and Howick. They will also have a strong presence at all major shopping centres.

A police spokesperson says: "During this time of the year, our beautiful beaches and public spaces attract large numbers of responsible, law-abiding community members who simply want to have a good time.

"However, we also recognise the presence of individuals engaging in public disturbances, breach of liquor ban and other unlawful activities.

"The operation initiated will focus on community reassurance, prevention, and road safety. Specifically, we are targeting issues related to alcohol, vehicle crime, driving offences, and retail theft in specified areas.

"Our ultimate goal is to deliver safer roads, safer communities, and safer homes."

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Metlifecare names new Clevedon retirement village Otau Ridge

Metlifecare has formally named its Clevedon retirement village Ōtau Ridge.

Ōtau (pronounced or-toe) is a name gifted to Metlifecare from Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki, who are the iwi mana whenua, tangata whenua of Clevedon and the Wairoa River (awa) that surrounds the village site.

Ōtau is the last recorded Māori name of the area before it was changed to Clevedon.

Metlifecare Development Manager, Joe Bartley, who is overseeing the Ōtau project, has engaged with Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki and the wider community, since Metlifecare purchased the site more than two years ago.

"We're honoured to have the name gifted to us by Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki. The name Ōtau translates to a safe crossing place on the awa Te Wairoa. It speaks to a narrative of travel, safe crossing and a place to settle.

"We believe this analogy symbolises the journey many residents take as they move into a retirement village and embark on a 'settled' life and where they are cared for," says Joe.

Construction of the first stage of the village, which includes 38 villas, commenced in June 2023 and is now well underway. Metlifecare expects to welcome the first residents late-2024.

"There has been a lot of early interest in this village from prospective customers



Vet advice: what not to feed your dog at Christmas

Yep! It is tough when those big brown eyes are staring forlornly at you but as tempting as it is to share your food with your dog during the festive season, our treats can be extremely dangerous to your canine companion. Here is a list of some of the worst offenders and why they make the naughty list.

Grapes and raisins - no one knows exactly why and how these are poisonous to dogs, and the exact volume needed to cause symptoms is difficult to predict.

Christmas pudding and mince pies

- these are full of currants, raisins and sultanas, which are toxic to dogs. Fat and suet can also cause severe stomach troubles, and they are usually laced with alcohol which is also poisonous to dogs.

Chocolate - in large enough amounts, chocolate and cocoa products can lead to gastrointestinal upsets, seizures or even kill your dog. Make sure chocolate coins, decorations and presents are kept out of reach.

Bones - cooked bones are brittle and splinter easily, which can lead to larger fragments getting 'stuck' causing obstructions and smaller ones causing gut irritation and perforation.

Don't leave bones anywhere they can be found! Poultry is hollow-boned and the bones splinter whether raw or cooked so must never be given to your dog under any circumstances. Turkey stuffing and gravy can also cause upset tummies.

Onions, garlic, chives - these can cause stomach upsets and could lead to red blood cell damage. It takes a few days for signs of poisoning to appear.

Macadamia nuts - within 12 hours of ingestion these can cause dogs to experience weakness (especially in the hind limbs) and depression, tremors, vomiting and increased temperature lasting for 12 to 48 hours.

Fat - ham rind or the drippings from the BBQ tray can lead to upset stomachs or pancreatitis.

If you suspect your dog has consumed any of these foods contact us immediately. The quicker treatment is sought, the easier and more successful it will be.

The bottom line – don't let your dogs anywhere near human treats at Christmas, however much they appear to love them.

Going on Holiday?

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Maraetai resident appeals for donations to support quake-affected Nepal

The 2015 earthquake which devastated parts of Nepal continues to impact residents in the Nepal's Langtang District, the most hardest hit by the quake, and a Maraetai couple are asking Coasters to help with donations of clothing and sturdy footwear.

Lyn Yeoman and husband Chris McMurray hosted a young Langtang resident, Tshering Lama, at their home in 2014. Lyn had worked in Nepal for several years and she says Tshering's family showed "wonderful kindness" to her. Tshering returned to Nepal, and a year later was due to be married when the magnitude 7.6 earthquake struck three days before her wedding. While Tshering and her family were unharmed, nine thousand people died in the quake, and a further 3.5 million were made homeless. The epicentre of the quake was between Kathmandu and Tshering's home district of Langtang. Langtang and the surrounding villages close to the epicentre were destroyed; first by the shocks and then by huge tsunamilike landslides coming down off the mountains, burying everything.

Lyn says most of the International Aid money that the Nepal government received from around world did not find its way to the areas hardest hit.

New Zealand Aid which did get through comprised small, local fundraising ventures, such as the fundraising efforts in Beachlands, Maraetai and Howick. "These funds went straight to relief work which was managed by our son Isaac, who was in Nepal, and every cent was accounted for. Many locals, here, also assisted with provision of warm clothing and gear, which we later arranged to be back-packed up to Kyanjin Gumba. This was invaluable!"

Today, however, people in the Langtang District are still struggling to rebuild their lives. A lack of tourists during the Covid pandemic meant that many fathers working in Kathmandu lost their employment. With no government child support or pensions, and no free education, many Langtang residents struggle.

"Whilst much rebuilding has taken place, partly through aid funding, families have had to take out loans to pay school fees and costs," says Lyn. "There is no longer a local school in Kyanjin Gompa, so local kids have to walk three days down (and up) the mountains and then take a local bus through the mountains to Kathmandu."

"Superficially things look ok because of the rebuilding, much of which was done through funds raised. But day to day costs are hard to meet," says Chris.

Lyn and Chris will return to Langtang after Christmas and are seeking donations

Clothing: men's, women's and children's warm, lined jackets; wool hats and warm, wool jerseys (not synthetic); track suits and track pants; thermal clothes and wool socks (any sizes); babies' woollen blankets.

- Footwear: sturdy walking boots, tough trainers (with plenty of life left please, all sizes), men's boots especially important (many sherpas and porters carry packs, timber and supplies up the mountains wearing jandals or hole-ridden shoes)
- Backpacks: (need 4 -6 packs) sturdy and clean. Sherpas and porters will use these to carry donated gear and the packs will be left for local porters in Kyanjin Gumba.
- Day packs for children's school things.
- Sponsorship: All parents want their children to attend school, but many parents can't afford school fees.

Sponsorship is sought for Tibetan children through Kopan Tibetan School in Kathmandu, which is where most Langtang children (those who can) attend. Sponsors can meet the child they sponsor, and see their school.

Rani and Gaugan at Maraetai Dairy have kindly offered to store donated goods in the interim, so any donations can be dropped

"Sooner rather than later, would help avoid cluttering the shop close to Christmas," says Lyn. "If you have a substantial amount of stuff, call us and we will collect."

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Stream restoration efforts to benefit from establisment of local nursery

The section of Papakura Stream which runs through Brookby has benefited from more than 88,000 additional native plants, planted by volunteers along the stream over 3,500 days over the past three years. Now the Conservation Volunteers New Zealand (CVNZ) team is asking for help from the local community as they begin to establish a large native plant nursery in the area.

CVNZ's handiwork can be seen on both sides of Brookby Road near the school, along the stream which flows through Papatoetoe Pony Club's grounds, and across the road where the waterway wends through privately owned farmland.

CVNZ coordinates local volunteers and corporate groups to carry out planting in the area, with the aim of improving the mauri of Papakura Stream which is the largest watercourse to enter the Manukau Harbour.

Since the Papakura Stream Restoration Project began three years ago, CVNZ volunteers have also collected 1,500kg of rubbish and removed 4.5 hectares of weeds from the area.

Trees for Survival, Forest and Bird and local landowners have also got behind the project, carrying out additional plantings and weed control.

A full time coordinator was appointed by CVNZ in 2023 to increase maintenance activities and closely monitor plant growth and survival. CVNZ will also begin

impact monitoring to see what difference our efforts are making to biodiversity in the area. This will be done through bird counts, monitoring, bio blitzes, eDna testing and water quality testing.

The scale of the Papakura Stream Restoration Project is huge. Until now CVNZ has purchased plants from around Auckland for the project, but now a new nursery is planned which will allow CVNZ to grow their own plants at Donalds Farm

just up the road on Ara Kotinga. The farm was donated by the late Donald Pearson to NZ Young Farmers and is currently run as an educational model farm, giving school students the opportunity to experience hands-on farming.

To help build the nursery at Donald's Farm, CVNZ is looking to the community for help with donating or providing discounted rates for any goods or services. either new or second hand, which could help reduce the nursery's set-up cost. Things like earthworks, fencing, irrigation, shade cloth, potting tables, growing units, shelving, sheds, a pump, plumbing, drainage, toilet and roofing are required, so CVNZ would be happy to hear from anyone able to help.

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Beloved cat reunited with Beachlands owners thanks to microchip

The importance of microchipping your pets has been highlighted by the recent return of Fluffy to her Beachlands home, after a two-month absence.

When the seven-year-old long-haired tabby failed to turn up for dinner one day, her owners began searching immediately.

"I was a bit like a crazy person, walking around the streets, calling her name into drain holes," says owner Jo Flood.

The family posted Fluffy's disappearance on social media grapevine pages all around South Auckland, and continued to search.

"The people around here were amazing, helping us look for her," says Jo.

Their search even led them to Warkworth where a cat matching Fluffy's description had been found. The family bought the cat home, only to realise shortly afterwards that it was not their beloved Fluffy.

"We knew within an hour, when we gave the cat a bath - Fluffy hates baths, but this cat really liked it!" says Jo.

The 'foster' cat remained with the Floods until its owners were eventually located. In the meantime, the search for Fluffy continued. Two months on, the family began to resign themselves to the fact that she might be gone for a while, though "we felt that Fluffy was still alive," says Jo.

On 27 November Jo received a phone call from Auckland Council Park Ranger Mags Ramsey. The local rangers had found a cat near a dotterel nest at Omana, and had taken it to Franklin Vets to scan for a microchip. The 7-year-old microchip was still active

and registered to the Floods, and Franklin Vets were quickly able to identify Fluffy.

Fluffy had lost a lot of weight and her long fur was matted, but she was clearly very happy to be reunited with her family.

Since then she has been "sleeping like crazy", says Jo. She is being fed two-hourly to help her regain weight.

"We would never have found her if she

didn't have a registered microchip," says Jo.

Fluffy had ventured more than 10 kilometres from home. "She's known for being a wanderer," says Jo. "She visits the neighbours regularly. There are 11 cats in the area directly surrounding us, and she is apparently the boss."

Since her return, Fluffy has been securely contained inside the family home.

Jo has some advice for other pet owners - make sure your pet is microchipped, and that the microchip is registered with the national registry (not just with your local vet). Being on the national register means pets can be identified no matter where they turn up.
