Zone change approval sets the stage for Beachlands transformation

up simply: Beachlands will more than double in size over the next 15-20 years.

An independent hearing panel of three commissioners has approved Beachlands South Partnership Limited's Plan Change 88 (PC88) application. The Plan Change means that 307 hectares of land currently bordered by Jack Lachlan Drive and Whitford Maraetai Road will be rezoned and developed into a 5,000-home subdivision.

Along with terrace housing and apartment buildings, the subdivision will also include larger residential lots, business and light industry zones, a hotel, land allocated for schools, recreation spaces, and a coastal walkway connecting the development to Pine Harbour Marina. The highest density living will be located closest to the marina. Some of the existing Formosa golf course, which currently sits on the site, will be retained.

The development will proceed in two stages, with 2900 homes to be built during the first stage. About half of the development land lies to the south and south-east of Formosa

A two hundred and sixty one page decision can be summed Golf Course, and is designated a Future Urban Zone with the capacity to build approximately 2000 further homes.

> The application to rezone the land was submitted by Beachlands South Limited Partnership (BSLP), a partnership between the MIB Limited Partnership (comprising limited partners Russell Property Group and Rob Bassett), NZSF Beachlands Ltd (a New Zealand Superannuation Fund entity), and Ngāi Tai Hāpai Development Limited Partnership, representing 6 iwi including local iwi Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki.

> Development manager and Russell Property Group managing director Brett Russell says the project team is pleased that their thorough planning and commitment to a sustainable, first class development has been recognised in the decision.

> Brett says the ruling is of regional significance. "It reflects many years of careful considered planning and work with key stakeholders and the Beachlands community by our

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The next few months are going to be extremely challenging for Councils around the country as they all work to finalise their latest 10 year budget, something I spoke about in my last piece. As I write this, we are yet to receive a breakdown of the public submissions following the month long consultation period.

It has become very clear that across NZ, Councils are really struggling to manage their budgets with reports that the average rates increase is 15%. Some areas are really scary -Greater Wellington Regional Council & Wellington City Council have proposed 19.8 & 16.4 respectively, Buller District is 31.8% and Hamilton 19.9%.


What that shows for me is that quite obviously costs of building and maintaining things has increased significantly but also that how Councils have done things needs a lot of scrutiny and how the opportunities to sort out the massive challenges and lack of funding to fix our waste and drinking water provision were wasted by the path the last Government went down with their water reforms. Now we are faced with a significant reversal that leaves Councils scrambling and the reality they need to find some serious money. It also highlights what I think is a need to have a look at the standards Councils need to meet which have added to the complexity and cost. Government requirements and standards have been a major contribution to the ballooning costs which I hope will be reviewed. The other thing I think needs to be looked at is the reliance on a property tax (rates) as a major revenue source. Councils do have in general an operational cost challenge but more importantly, they have a revenue generation problem. That is one of the reasons we proposed a Future Fund to help our ability to be less reliant on rates and the Government.

On any one day in Auckland, there will be over 2000 sites where work is happening within or alongside a road that requires what is called temporary traffic management (TTM). A huge percentage of those are projects not under the control of Auckland Transport such as cables, water and development. TTMPs and the number of orange road cones have quite rightly been at the forefront of public criticism. It has become an industry all in itself (a bit like scaffolding) and that is one of the largest challenges we now have trying to rein it in, we are battling an industry that is doing very well about having as many cones and people sitting in trucks as possible. The impacts on communities through the disruption has not been given due consideration. So Auckland Transport is responding to the noise with work and trials underway to redesign the framework that TTM is assessed by risk as opposed to just having a one size fits all approach as currently exists.

Alongside that for our own AT projects we are imposing a maximum 10% cost cap for TTM. Currently some smaller projects have TTM costs between 20 and 30%. We will also be looking at imposing higher charges for other projects that need to happen in the road so there is an incentive to get things done quicker and with less disruption. The desired outcome is projects completed faster, with less overall disruption from TTM and reduced project cost.

AT has also being doing things differently of late, using different products like precast pedestrian crossings instead of constructing on site, working longer on weekends and bundling works in close proximity to get things done quicker and cheaper. So effort is being made to be smarter and being fairly close to it, I am pretty happy with that.



multifaceted, local and international project team.

"We are delighted that this care and attention to detail, and the comprehensive nature of our application, has been recognised by the independent commissioners in their findings," he said.

The PC88 application process attracted 383 submissions. Eighty five per cent of these were opposed to the development or wanted to see changes made to aspects of the development.

Opposing the application were a large number of individual submitters and organisations including Auckland Council, Auckland Transport, Waka Kotahi, Beachlands Maraetai Omana Concerned Citizens, Whitford Residents & Ratepayers and the Clevedon Community & Business Association.

Watercare, the Ministry of Education, Manukau Quarries, Pine Harbour Marina, Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga, the Pōhutukawa Coast Trails Committee, Royal Forest and Bird protection Society and the Whitford Coast Society were among those who asked that the application be approved with amendments.

Opposer's concerns mostly centred on infrastructure such as traffic, roading and water. The independent hearing panel rejected the majority of submitter's concerns, and accepted much of the evidence supplied by BSLP. The panel noted that two key factors which led to the PC88 approval were the development's proximity to the existing ferry service from Pine Harbour Marina to the CBD, and the provision of land for education facilities.

The Ministry of Education said that if PC88 was approved, a new primary

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school would be required to accommodate growth and further work would be undertaken to determine the demand for a secondary school. In the past, the Ministry of Education has indicated that the Beachlands South development would provide the population growth required to build a secondary school.

Water for the new development will come from a reservoir and the existing Pine Harbour acquifer. An onsite wastewater treatment plant will discharge onto land or via wetland to a stream. All new dwellings will have non-potable water requirements (for toilets, laundry and gardens) supplied by rainwater tanks or bladders.

Franklin Local Board made extensive submissions on the application, including that Beachlands had few council-managed facilities, gaps in footpath provision, no secondary school or emergency medical facilities and largely relied on tank water.

The Board asked for road and intersection upgrades, more walking and cycling infrastructure, and raised concerns about public transport.

Chair Angela Fulljames says the board was also concerned about managing wastewater, increased take from the Pine Harbour bore and protecting the ecology of the area.

"We also voiced concerns that the size of the area set aside for light industrial might not provide enough local jobs for the

increased population, and that adequate play and recreation spaces should be developed.

"Local boards are responsible for communicating residents' views regarding Auckland Council's policies and plans, including private plan change requests. The decision-makers, in this case, the commissioners, must consider those views.

"We are still working through the decision and will be liaising with council, Auckland Transport staff and the Ministry of Education on the implications," she says.

Fellow local board member Amanda Hopkins says: "We remain concerned about roads in the wider area and safety on them, and the adverse effects on Whitford because of increased traffic and changes to the roundabout, and we are disappointed provision has not been made for further upgrades to Whitford-Maraetai Road in the early stages of the development."

Submitters have 30 days in which to lodge an appeal against the decision.

In older age, untreated bite issues continue to cause harm. Over time, dental misalignment can lead to enamel wear and reduced crown height, visually aging the smile and increasing the susceptibility to tooth decay. Prosthetic procedures become more challenging, often necessitating pre-prosthetic treatment by orthodontists, thus prolonging overall treatment duration.

In summary, early intervention to address bite issues is crucial for maintaining overall health. Whether in childhood or later years, improper bite alignment can contribute to a range of



health issues, impacting not only dental wellness but also posture, joint function, and overall quality of life. Beyond cosmetic concerns, correcting the bite serves to uphold holistic well-being. While a beautiful smile is valuable, the primary objective of bite correction remains the preservation of long-term health.

Plan Change 88 decision

Ardmore Hall and reserve sale

Why does Clevedon think it is fair to sell Ardmore's only council assets (the Hall And Bell Field Reserve) and make a fancy footpath through Clevedon with the proceeds?

The Hall caught fire in January 2021. The first report written on this and the reserve was in March 2021 and presented to the Franklin Local Board (FLB) stating that the reserve had a wetness problem.

Two other reports written for the FLB commented on the wetness, along with

two reports from the local cricket club also complaining about the wetness along with numerous reports from the contract mowers and the contractors tasked with the removal of trees blown down by Cyclone Gabrielle. Numerous phone calls were made to the FLB, Watercare and Veolia.

Complaints were made to myself and Ardmore School about the field being a complete rice paddy, which parents could not walk on to pick up children.

After taking a 5 minute walk in the reserve I discovered a burst water main releasing 2 litres every 4 seconds. Over three years this would have resulted in around 786,240 litres of water covering the entire Bell Field at a cost to someone of around \$393.120.00.

This because it suited FLB not to do any thing to help with its proposed sale.

When I got the leak detection unit to attend I met them at the hall, only to be told they had already identified a new leak connecting the main to the Hall.

I led them to the real leak, and they were astounded at the volume and the damage done to the field. This leak was first notified in the report to then-FLB Chair Andy Baker.

If AT had done its job, which is a safety drain-cleaning exercise, the field would not have flooded. Andy Baker has been notified of this in his new role on the Board of AT.

I hope we do not have to wait the 12 months that we are still waiting for after AT spent \$200.000.00 trying to fix the water flooding issue at the Church Road intersection.

If the FLB had done its job the Reserve would not be as simple to sell with funds relocated to Clevedon.

I ask Clevedon residents to inform the local FLB members to stop this process. Over 400 people are in favour of stopping the sale process of Ardmore's assets.

The reserve leak has now been fixed but until the perimeter drain has been cleared, the reserve remains under threat from runoff from the surrounding land.

Police raid Clevedon property in search for wanted man

Police raided a Clevedon property on Tuesday 9 April.

The raid was carried out as part of Police's attempts to locate 25-year-old Auckland man Ralph Park, who has several warrants for arrest for a violent kidnapping that took place on 2 April in Beach Haven.

Before sunrise, Police approached a Creightons Road rental property.

"On approaching the address, our staff have encountered occupants at the address who became obstructive towards them," said Detective Inspector Callum McNeill.

Police spent some time speaking with these occupants before entry to the property could safely be carried out.

A clandestine laboratory was discovered at the property, and due to the nature of the discovery, resources from other emergency services were deployed as a precautionary measure.

Detective Inspector McNeill says Ralph Park was not located at the property.

"Our investigation team are continuing to carry out a thorough examination of the rural property, and at this stage we can't advise of any further items of interest located," Detective Inspector McNeill says.

"A 35-year-old man was arrested at the address and will be facing charges relating to the clandestine laboratory that was discovered."

The Clevedon rental property is managed by a local real estate agency.

"Police are in contact with the property's owners, who are overseas, to update them on the situation," Detective Inspector McNeill says.

Meanwhile, Police enquiries will continue to locate Ralph Park.

He is described as being 166 centimetres tall and is of thin build.

Detective Inspector McNeill says anyone with information on Park's whereabouts should contact Police.

"If you see Ralph Park, continue to consider him dangerous and do not approach him.

"Contact Police immediately on 111."


