

Pōhutukawa Landing welcomes 100th resident

Barry and Roberta Southern are officially the 100th and 101st residents to move into the Metlifecare Pohutukawa Landing retirement village at Beachlands.

The village decided to hold a celebratory party for residents to mark the occasion with the Southerns being the most recent residents to move in.

They haven't come far, having had a house in Beachlands since 2011. Previously they were at Half Moon Bay.

Barry says he and Roberta did their research before moving to the village. "There are lots of reasons why we moved here. We had our own house but decided that, as we are getting older, the village gave us more flexibility and it was well worth making the move."

Pōhutukawa Landing has been open to residents since May 2021 and Village Manager Jane Marcellus says more residents

are signed up to move in but with a slow down in the housing market are having to wait longer to sell their own homes.

As well as the villas, the Harbour and Marina apartment buildings are now complete with the first residents moving in. The care building will be ready late next year with more villas to come as well.

"We are not even half way [to reaching capacity] at the moment. There's still quite a bit to do," says Jane.

While there are residents moving into the village from outside the area, Jane says most are either locals who have opted for retirement village living, or who have family here, or have some connection with the area such as having lived here at some time in the past.

"We have a very vibrant young at heart community here," she says.

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Guest editorial by Mayor of Auckland Wayne Brown

Aucklanders voted overwhelmingly for me because of my five key policies. Accountability is important to me, and coming up to my first anniversary as Mayor, I think it's a good time to do a stocktake of my progress on these so far. Commentators have said my first year has seen me lead a council through what's been perhaps the most difficult period since the supercity amalgamated in 2010. Yes, there were the catastrophic Anniversary weekend floods and Cyclone Gabrielle. On top of that, I inherited a heap of debt and an ever widening \$325 million budget hole. I swore I would face issues head-on, make tough decisions, and fix Auckland.

A majority of Aucklanders voted to stop wasting money. They said they wanted better, cheaper, and faster services. My councillors and I managed to agree on a budget that cut costs following lengthy discussions articulating the reality of our debt situation. It involved compromise, but I don't see that as a weakness. It means we listened to Aucklanders and made decisions, which is our job. We reduced our operating spend by \$83 million in the Annual Budget. Just by being grumpy and asking for better returns, the Port of Auckland increased their dividend by \$10 million this year. I also asked council to accelerate their office consolidation programme, which was good but going too slow for my liking. As of today, this acceleration has really shrunk the number of offices council and CCO's have in the CBD, a move that will contribute to \$13 million a year in savings. I don't think it's unreasonable that CCO's share offices with the council to reduce costs. Councillors agreed to the partial sale of Auckland Airport shares, which is now saving around \$25million a year in interest costs.

What I am also trying to get across to our organisation is the need to sell investments that don't return our cost of capital. If it is costing Aucklanders more money to keep owning assets than they

return in cash to us, then it's time to sell up and invest in something that can help reduce rates in the long term. Right now, in this high interest rate environment, the best investment we can make is to pay down debt. This isn't politics; this is good decision-making.

I also campaigned on finishing the big projects and making the most of what we have before starting any new projects. This couldn't be more true than in transport and infrastructure. I am leading the development of an integrated transport plan that we will agree with central government, which is already underway and has many priorities already adopted. I want to prioritise rail infrastructure and the use of rail to get big trucks off the road. The CRL will play a big role here by doubling our train capacity, as will the moves we are making with buses: the Northern Busway is going great, the Eastern Busway is underway, and a permanent Northwestern Busway is the next priority. We will also be looking at improving the Mangere-to-Airport route. We are implementing more dynamic lanes and will be using more transponders on buses to signal light-traffic signals when a bus approaches. I'm also looking at where time-of-use charging might be helpful. Funding is underway for level crossings to get the most out of the City Rail Link (CRL) and I look forward to seeing this mega project finished. It is unfortunate that light rail has turned into the expensive political football it is. With my background, I know we could do it better, faster, cheaper. This makes more sense than building more motorways and tunnels. When we look at overseas models, surface light rail could be 20 times cheaper than the proposed model; it does not need to be tunnelled, and making use of existing infrastructure couldn't ring truer here when we consider cost-saving

On infrastructure, we have a significant capital programme being delivered for more efficient growth, and our Making Space for Water programme, as well as things like the Central Interceptor to deal with wastewater overflows, under construction. These are important moves following the catastrophic floods at the start of the year. I'm sure I don't need to emphasise the need for Making Space for Water in our region's infrastructure.

I also promised to take back control of Council-Controlled Organisations (CCOs). I have been reminding staff that while they are experts in their field, it is their job to advise elected officials, and it is the role of elected officials alone to make the decisions on behalf of Aucklanders. That is how democracy works. On that note, I've been able to get councillors to provide stronger and clearer direction to CCOs, and even Auckland Transport is beginning to change its approach. Legislative change is also on the way here.

The Long-Term Plan is our next big challenge to get consensus on what we invest in for the next ten years. So far, I have ensured it is done differently from the start, bringing councillors in from the beginning with a joint direction document for the council group on what our priorities are and what we want to see in the LTP (direction document). We are getting more information than we have had before to make the best decisions for Aucklanders on the things that matter to them.

I am looking forward to a new relationship with Wellington and to making an Auckland deal with the government that is in lock-step with Aucklanders and why they voted for me. Stopping waste, getting Auckland moving, taking back control of CCOs, fixing our broken infrastructure, and making the most of our environment and harbour.

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Panel considers fate of Beachlands at independent hearing

Next week a panel of commissioners will decide whether Beachlands will double in size over the next decade.

An independent hearing is scheduled to take place from Monday 27 November to Wednesday 29 November to consider Beachlands South Partnership Limited's application for Plan Change 88 (PC88).

The application seeks permission to rezone 307 hectares of land immediately south of the existing urban area, on land currently occupied by and surrounding Rydges Formosa Golf Resort. If the application is successful, it will see the land developed into a subdivision comprised of mixed housing, terrace housing and apartment buildings, a light industry zone, commercial area, and an open space area for sports and recreation. Included within the plans is an allocated space for a primary and secondary school, though construction of these would be dependent upon the Ministry of Education's willingness to acquire the land.

Auckland Council has received 383 submissions on PC88. Eighty-five percent of those seek that the application should be declined, or declined but amended if approved.

Consultant planner Chloe Trenouth authored a comprehensive report on behalf of Auckland Council in response to the application which will be discussed at the hearing. Trenouth's view leans in favour of declining the application,

saying:

"I have concluded that PC88 does not give effect to the National Policy Statement for Urban Development or the Regional Policy Statement because it would not contribute to a well-functioning urban environment or achieve a quality compact urban form because people would need to travel out of the area for employment and other services and manitias

"The scale of urban expansion proposed would almost double the size of the existing coastal township of Beachlands, which is not well connected in terms of roads or public transport. Without the ability to provide for all the social and economic needs of the community, the community will be reliant on meeting these outside the township which is inefficient."

Trenouth identified issues with many aspects of the proposal, particularly transport and water supply.

Three hearing commissioners will consider evidence presented by all parties, including submitters, at next week's hearing. After taking time to consider PC88 in depth, they will issue a decision that will be publicly notified by council.

Space available at upcoming mental health courses

Feedback from the event was very supportive of the initiative, with future plans shared including a second hui in the new year to continue the conversation and a Hauora/Health Day later in the year.

Council to consult on targeted enviro rate

Franklin residents will be asked if they would pay a \$52 annual targeted rate to help pay for pathways in the district when Auckland Council consults on its 10-year Budget.

That consultation does not happen until next year, but Board chair Angela Fulljames says Franklin has asked for the question to be included.

"We have recommended the Governing Body consult on introducing a Franklin Local Board Paths Targeted Rate of \$52 (GST incl) increasing each year with inflation, on all rateable properties to fund additional paths investment as part of the 10-year Budget.

"Active transport modes - walking and cycling, are a priority for us. Our communities have shown a consistent interest in options that enable them to contribute to climate action at a local level, and we have so far allocated around \$2.4 million to progress paths in partnership with community groups.



"We have developed a programme for additional investment across all three subdivisions, Wairoa, Pukekohe, and Waiuku that would have to be funded by a targeted rate.

"Investment in paths infrastructure is a public good. The paths generate benefits to the entire area through improved connections between residential, transport, and urban hubs."

The board is following through after an earlier public consultation indicated people were willing for information to be gathered so an informed decision can be reached.

"Early indications from meetings Franklin Ward Councillor Andy Baker and I are attending are that the more we as a board can generate in project revenue, and thus control within our area, the more likely we are to deliver these sorts of projects, given budget restraints," Fulljames says.

Council staff have recommended the targeted rate – and annual inflation increases – to generate around \$20 million over the period of Council's 10-year Budget 2024-2034.

The proposed paths would mainly be in urban areas and connect with existing paths as well as the wider public transport network.

Water views sought



Freshwater rules are changing and it's time for residents to have their say on how to improve rivers, lakes and streams.

Auckland Council is checking with the community on what residents think of proposed measures to protect, use, and allocate freshwater.

Franklin Local Board chair Angela Fulljames says a working group is developing the implementation of council's freshwater policy - Te Mauri o te Wai.

"The healthy state of our freshwater is essential. Water is the most fundamental thing to our existence. Without it we can't function, but many of us never do much more than turn on a tap and expect it to be there.

"In rapidly developing areas like Beachlands, we have seen what happens when drought comes, we have endured a water crisis, and we understand more than most that we

need to commit to improve our rivers, lakes and streams.

"Council wants to hear from every Aucklander with an interest in the city's freshwater future. This is about the life-sustaining capacity of water, and putting freshwater first so we can improve our environment."

Details are available online at the akhaveyoursay.aucklandcouncil.govt. nz website.

The work is driven by the National Policy Statement for Freshwater Management, which will affect how Aucklanders manage their land and water use.

It applies to rivers, streams, lakes, wetlands, groundwater and springs, and requires councils to put the health of freshwater first, then consider the needs of people and other water use demands.

Consultation is open until 4 December.

Strategy sets growth path



A strategy to govern the city's growth over the next three decades has been welcomed by Auckland Council's Andy Baker.

The Franklin Ward councillor says the Future Development Strategy is a way of ensuring homes, jobs, and infrastructure are built in the right places, and balances the need for development in urban or 'brownfield' areas with new 'greenfield' sites.

Baker says working with the board has resulted in specific features for Franklin, meaning work can be done that recognises the area's features, especially existing and planned employment opportunities.

"A lot of our people must travel to work. We need to create a better balance if we want to enable investment in schools, transport options and meet our carbon emissions targets."

Baker voted against the draft strategy because it did not sufficiently consider areas like Franklin, but the changes made give him confidence in the adopted plan.

"We have all seen prime land taken for housing, and that remains an issue, but the strategy also avoids development in flooding and natural hazard risk areas, where a high bar has been set for those wanting to develop, and some of the most at-risk parts of the future urban zone revert to rural zoning."

He says the strategy seeks to concentrate development around existing infrastructure. "That is common-sense, the cost of building infrastructure to support developments outside those areas has proven challenging.

"The strategy will help create a city where people can live close to work and the amenities they need, which will in turn enable easier public transport, protect our environment and reduce emissions."


College offers future students chance to have a go at underwater hockey

Howick College Underwater Hockey has an exciting opportunity this term for local students heading to the College in 2024.

Never heard of underwater hockey before? Register and head along to their FREE 'Have-a-Go' underwater hockey sessions this Sunday 26 November.

All gear for the Have-A-Go day is supplied.

"Underwater hockey is a sporting opportunity that opens up to young people for the first time in year 9. We are excited to have this early opportunity for incoming students to try the sport for the first time," says Craig Marshall, team manager for Howick College's underwater hockey teams.



Underwater hockey is played on the bottom of a swimming pool, usually at a depth of 2 metres. Players use a mask, snorkel, fins and a specially shaped stick to push a weighted puck into a goal. There are 6 players from each team in the water at any one time, with up to 4 substitutes waiting poolside to sub in.

The connection with Underwater Hockey at Howick College goes back to the 1980s. The school's coaches are themselves past students who have represented NZ in age group and elite level world championships. There is a strong Auckland secondary schools competition held during terms 2 and 3 with both junior and senior girls and mixed (open) teams.



Kaupapa Kererū







